2016 National Preparedness Month and America's PrepareAthon!

Our Nation faces diverse threats and hazards that challenge our collective security and resilience, and reinforce the need to strengthen national preparedness. September is National Preparedness Month, and this year's theme is "Don't Wait. Communicate. Make Your Emergency Plan Today." National Preparedness Month serves as a reminder that everyone must take action to prepare, now and throughout the year, for the types of emergencies that could impact us.

Each week of National Preparedness Month will have a topical theme to help better coordinate department and agency communications activities. The themes are:

Week 1 (September 4-10): Preparing Family and Friends
Week 2 (September 11-17): Preparing through Service
Week 3 (September 18-24): Individual Preparedness
Week 4 (September 25-30): Lead up to National PrepareAthon! Day

National Preparedness Month is anchored by America's PrepareAthon!, our nationwide community-based campaign, which is required by Presidential Policy Directive - 8: National Preparedness. The month culminates with National PrepareAthon! Day, on September 30, a national day of action that encourages individuals, families, businesses, and communities nationwide to take a specific action to make them more prepared. America's PrepareAthon! provides opportunities throughout the year to take preparedness actions through drills, emergency planning, and exercises for local hazards, including earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, wildfires, and winter storms.

Departments and agencies are encouraged to participate and promote the preparedness campaign in any of several ways, including:

• Encourage your department and agency stakeholders and partners to participate in National Preparedness Month. Stakeholder participation can include employee preparedness drills or exercises, family preparedness planning, or other

mission-relevant efforts led by your department or agency (e.g., chemical sector preparedness training, housing commission resilience planning, or promoting preparedness in schools);

- Lead your department or agency efforts to promote Federal employee and contractor preparedness actions (e.g., family communication planning, shelter-in-place drill, orderly evacuation exercise, and education on weather watches and warnings). Promote preparedness efforts and resources such as utilizing the America's PrepareAthon! resources at Community.FEMA.gov/Resources, downloading the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) mobile app at FEMA.gov/mobile-app, safeguarding important documents, or creating a financial preparedness plan;
- Promote acts of service to commemorate the 15th anniversary of the September 11 terrorist attacks;
- Register your department or agency participation and actions at Ready.gov/Prepare; and
- Use your department or agency website and social media channels to promote participation in National Preparedness Month and America's PrepareAthon! throughout the month (e.g., use the media resources available at <a href="Ready.gov/September">Ready.gov/September</a>, post PrepareAthon! web banners, a video greeting, or a blog message from agency leadership on your website encouraging taking preparedness actions, and participate in Twitter chats using the #PrepareAthon hashtag).
